AUDIT OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2022

Dear Sirs,

We are pleased to enclose herewith two copies of the draft financial statements of Association for Water Applied Education and Renewable Energy for the year ended December 31, 2022 together with our draft report thereon duly initialled by us for identification purposes. We shall be pleased to sign our draft report in its present or amended form after the financial statements have been approved by the Board members and signed on their behalf by the Executive Director and Finance Secretary and on receipt of the following:

a) Letter of representation addressed to us on behalf of the Board Members and signed by the Executive Director and Finance Secretary as per draft provided by us.

Our observations on this set of financial statements are as follows:

 RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE MANAGEMENT AND AUDITORS IN RELATION TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The responsibilities of the independent auditors in a usual examination of financial statements are stipulated in section 249 of the Companies Act, 2017 and International Standards on Auditing.

While the auditors are responsible for forming and expressing their opinion on the financial statements, the responsibility for preparation of such financial statements is primarily that of the Company's management. The management's responsibilities include the maintenance of adequate accounting records and internal controls, the selection and application of accounting policies, safeguarding of the assets of the Company and prevention and detection of fraud and irregularities. The audit of financial statements does not relieve the management of its responsibilities.



2. AUTHORISATION OF BANK RECONCILIATION PROCESS

We have been provided with the excel based monthly bank reconciliation which were neither signed off by the preparer nor reviewed and approved by any authorized personnel. This may result in failure to reconcile difference between balance as per general ledger and cash book in an accurately and timely manner. Lack of proper authorisation over bank reconciliation process may cause errors or fraud related to cash to go undetected and may lack accountability. We recommend that proper authorisation control over bank reconciliation should be put in place to ensure that errors made in the reconciliation process are detected and corrected on a timely basis.

We have also observed that the society does not have an internal audit department. Internal audit function is an independent and objective assurance and controlling activity, designed to add value and improve the Society's operations.

We recommend that there should be an internal audit department to carry out checks regularly to ensure that the systems are operating as designed and are being rigidly followed and that procedures are standardized. The internal audit department should also ensure that the assets of the Society are properly safeguarded at all times.

MANUAL INVOICES

We have noted that payment vouchers used for recording of payments are not system generated and pre-numbered or serially numbered. Vouchers are prepared in excel spreadsheets and after obtaining approvals, voucher is entered in the system. Spreadsheets are prone to errors and/or inaccuracies, in the absence of effective logical access controls there are data integrity, and accuracy related issues. Further, in the absence of prenumbered vouchers, the completeness and sequential control may not be ensured over payment vouchers.

PROPERTY AND EQUIPMENT

We have observed that a fixed assets register has not been maintained to provide itemized control over the fixed assets of the Company as prescribed by revised Technical Release 6 of Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan. We recommend that a fixed assets register should be maintained in the prescribed form so that cost and details of physical location of each item of fixed assets is easily accessible as and when required.



5. UNIQUE DOCUMENT IDENTIFICATION NUMBER (UDIN)

To enhance public trust on auditor's report, the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan (ICAP) has issued a Directive 4.27, whereby it is required that every practicing chartered accountant will place UDIN generated from ICAP portal on the following reports:

- Auditors' Report on General Purpose Financial Statements
- Auditors' Report on Interim Financial Information
- Auditors' Report on Statement of Compliance with Code of Corporate Governance.

In order to obtain the UDIN, auditors are required to upload certain financial information of the reporting entity. Accordingly, we are required to upload the information on ICAP's portal for generation of UDIN. The ICAP, in its frequently asked questions, has assured that Client's confidential data would be entered by the concerned engagement partner himself and such data would not be available for any unauthorized use.

Compliance of the above ICAP Directive is mandatory and non-compliance will result in professional misconduct under Chartered Accountants Ordinance, 1961.

We hereby brought this into the attention of the management and the Board of Directors of the Society.

PROVISION FOR TAXATION

As per management, there is no impact of tax on financial report as no tax is payable by ssociation for Water Applied Education & Renewable Energy (AWARE) ("the Society")) in accordance with section 100C of the Income Tax Ordinance, 2001.

Section 100C has been introduced which states that the income of non-profit organizations, trusts or welfare institutions, as mentioned in sub-section (2) of the Income Tax Ordinance, 2001 shall be allowed a tax credit equal to one hundred percent of the tax payable, including minimum tax and final taxes payable under any of the provisions of Income Tax Ordinance, 2001, subject to the following conditions, namely:

- (a) return has been filed;
- (b) tax required to be deducted or collected has been deducted or collected and paid;
- (c) withholding tax statements for the immediately preceding tax year have been filed:
- (d) the administrative and management expenditure does not exceed 15% of the total receipts.



We have been informed by the management that the Society is in compliance with the all the conditions of Section 100C of Income Tax Ordinance, 2001 to claim the 100% tax credit. As such, no provision for taxation has been made in the statement of income and expenditure. Kindly confirm that this is in order.

RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

We have been informed by the management that there were no transactions with related parties other than those disclosed in the notes to the financial statements.

CONTINGENCIES AND COMMITMENTS

We have been informed by the management that there are no contingencies and commitments as on the date of the financial statements other than those disclosed in the financial statements.

FRAUDS AND ERRORS

We have been informed by the management that no case of fraud and error, has been brought to their knowledge during the reporting period. Kindly confirm the representations made by management.

CONTINGENCIES AND COMMITMENTS

We have been informed by the management that there are no contingencies and commitments at the reporting date other than disclosed in the financial statements. Kindly confirm this is in order.

11. COMPLIANCE WITH STATUTORY LAWS AND REGULATIONS

We have been informed by the management that there were no instances of non-compliance with statutory laws and regulations that would have financial reporting implications. Kindly confirm the representations made by management.

SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

We have been informed by management that there were no subsequent events having an impact on amounts and / or disclosures in financial statements. Kindly confirm the representations made by management.

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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF ASSOCIATION FOR WATER, APPLIED EDUCATION AND RENEWABLE ENERGY

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of ASSOCIATION FOR WATER, APPLIED EDUCATION AND RENEWABLE ENERGY ("the Association") which comprise of the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2022, and statement of income and expenditure account, the statement of changes in accumulated funds, statement of cash flows for the year then ended and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, or give a true and fair view of the financial position as at December 31, 2022 and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with the approved accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with the International Standards on Auditing (ISAs) as applicable in Pakistan. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Association in accordance with the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants' Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants as adopted by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan (the Code), and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Members for the Financial Statements

The Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with the approved accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan and for such internal control as the management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Association for Water, Applied Education and Renewable Energy ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Society or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Board Members are responsible for overseeing the Society financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs as applicable in Pakistan will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.



As part of an audit in accordance with ISAs as applicable in Pakistan, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures
 that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the
 effectiveness of the Association for Water, Applied Education and Renewable Energy internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Association for Water, Applied Education and Renewable Energy ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Association for Water, Applied Education and Renewable Energy to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with the Board Members regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

Other Matter

The financial statements of the Association for the year ended December 31, 2021 were audited by another firm of chartered accountants, who had expressed an unmodified opinion thereon vide their report dated July 22, 2022.

ASSOCIATION FOR WATER, APPLIED EDUCATION AND RENEWABLE ENERGY NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2022

1 NATURE AND STATUS OF BUSINESS

Association for Water Applied Education & Renewable Energy "AWARE" (Organization) is registered under the Societies Registration Act. 1860. The main objectives of the Association are to provide the people organizational, institutional, technical and infrastructure training and to establish research center for the use of renewable energy resources for sustainable development.

The registered office of the AWARE is situated at Rohal Wai Road near Pakistan chowk Umerkot, Tehsil and district Umerkot, Sindh Pakistan.

2 BASIS OF PREPARATION

2.1 Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan. The accounting and reporting standards applicable in Pakistan comprise of Revised Accounting and Financial Reporting Standard for Small-sized Entities (Revised AFRS for SSEs) issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan (ICAP) as notified under the Companies Act, 2017 and, Accounting Standard, for Not for Profit Organizations (Accounting Standard, for NPOs) issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan as notified under the Companies Act, 2017 and provisions of and directives issued under the Companies Act, 2017.

3 Functional and presentation currency

These financial statements have been prepared and presented in Pakistani "Rupees", which is the functional and presentation currency.

3 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

3.1 Property and equipment

Property and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any. Depreciation is charged to statement of income and expenditure account using the reducing balance method at the rates specified in note 5. Depreciation on additions during the year is charged from the month of addition when the asset is available for use, whereas, no depreciation is charged in the month of disposal.

3.2 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents for the purpose of statement of cash flow comprise of cash in hand and balances with banks in current and saving accounts.

3.3 Trade and other payables

Trade and other payables are recognized initially at fair value of the consideration to be paid in the future for goods and services received, and are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less.

3.4 Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the Organization has a present (legal or constructive) obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate of the obligation can be made. Provisions are reviewed at each reporting date and accordingly adjusted to reflect current best estimates.

3.5 Foreign currency transactions and translations

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of transactions. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from translation of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at year-end exchange rates are recognized in the statement of financial activities.

3.6 Grants for funded projects

Grants for funded projects are considered restricted with separate accounting records being maintained for each fund and accounted for on deferral method. Grants restricted for capital expenditure are recognized as 'deferred capital grant' when received.

3.7 Income recognition

Income is recognized to the extent it is possible that the economic benefits will flow to the Organization and income can be measured reliably. Income is measured at fair value of consideration received or receivable and is recognized on the following basis:

- Donation, membership fee and profit on bank accounts are recognized on receipt basis.
- Income in respect of Grant Funded Projects is recognized as and when the related expenses are incurred for these projects, and equivalent amount is transferred from fund balance to the statement of financial activities.

- Deferred capital grant is recognized as income to match depreciation provided during the year on the related capital assets.
- Management share and management charge for Grant Funded Projects are recognized as income as per the donor agreements.

3.8 Taxation

The Organization has Non-Profit Organization status under the Income Tax Ordinance, 2001, therefore the receipts of the Organization are exempt from tax. Consequently no provision for taxation has been made in these financial statements.

4 CRITICAL ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENTS

The preparation of financial statements requires the use of accounting estimates which, by definition, will seldom equal the actual results. Management also needs to exercise judgement in applying the Organization's accounting policies.

The areas involving significant estimates or judgements are:

i. Useful lives and residual values of operating fixed assets - note 5
